"So you also, when you have done all that you were commanded, say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty.'"

(Luke 17:10 ESV)

It's nice to be acknowledged for the things that we do. It makes us feel good when people honor us for our achievements. However, in our society today, this is taken to an extreme. We seem to feel that we deserve acknowledgement and honor for everything that we do.

Children feel that they should be rewarded for getting good grades in school. They feel that they should be honored for good attendance. They fail to understand that the opportunity to receive a good education is a blessing. And, in response to this blessing, good attendance and good grades are a duty.

In the same way, they feel that they should receive a trophy for participating in sports. They fail to understand that it's a blessing to be on the

team. And, in response to this blessing, a determined effort to help the team succeed is an obligation.

The same mindset follows us into adulthood. If we do well in college, we feel that we're deserving of a good job. If we perform well on the job, we feel that we deserve a grand title, a pay raise, or a promotion. We fail to understand that having a good job is a blessing. And it's our duty to give our greatest effort in response to this blessing.

We also tend to think this way in our life of faith. We think that we should be commended by God for every act of service we perform. Because of our service, we feel entitled to his blessing. And we think that we should be honored by those we serve.

Our feelings about this are so strong that, if acknowledgement isn't given, we feel slighted. We feel that our efforts have been in vain. We feel devalued and disregarded. And we tend to give up and cease in our efforts.

Jesus addresses this mindset in Luke 17. He uses the picture of a man and his servant to make his point. He points out that, when the servant comes in after a hard day's work, he isn't invited to sit down to enjoy a meal. It's expected that he will prepare supper, dress properly, and serve his master. And only after his duties are completed is he able to eat and drink.


Jesus also points out that the servant is not thanked for what he has done. He is not thanked because he's merely done his job. He's done nothing more than his duty.

In the same way, he tells us, we shouldn't expect commendation for the things we've done. Instead, we're to acknowledge that we're unworthy servants. We're to acknowledge that we've done only our duty.

This is very true. We must always bear in mind that the only thing we deserve is death and hell. We must bear in mind that, because of what he's done for us, the Lord is deserving of our faithfulness.

This can be a tough pill to swallow. God does not owe us anything because of our service. The simple fact of the matter is that, because of what he has done for us, God is deserving of our service. We have been saved by his grace and mercy, and for this reason he is deserving of our honor.

If God then honors us, it's only because of his grace. If he blesses us, it's only because of his mercy. We are nothing more than unworthy servants who've done only our duty.

There are some key dates that you should be away as we look forward to spring. These dates are:


February 14: Sunday School kids go to Knife River Care Center

Sole Hope

What is Sole Hope you ask? Sole Hope is non-profit organization that is striving to prevent foot-borne illnesses in Uganda. The culprit is jiggers, small fleas that bore into the soles of feet causing infection, paralysis and in severe cases, amputation. So how does Sole Hope help?

They accomplish this in two way. First they educate the local population on how to prevent infection and contact with cause. Second they teach and encourage the local population to learn the trade of shoe making through sustainable practices.

So how is Prince of Peace going to help? We are once again holding a church wide, intergenerational mission project Sunday, April 24th and will be helping Sole Hope in two way. The first way is to have a cutting party. The shoes that the local tradesmen make are made out of recycled denim. On April 24th we will use patterns to cut sets from 100% heavy weight cotton denim donated by us, the members of Prince of Peace. For every pattern set cut, \$10 is needed to get that pattern set to Uganda and those shoes made by local tradesmen. To sponsor a pair of shoes, please grab a "pair" from the table in the back of the church and send it on its way to Uganda by placing it on the map and the donation in the jar. So even if you don't have denim to donate or can't help cut you can still support a pair of shoes' journey to Uganda.

The second way we can help is through a list of needs. These items are used to help treat the problem. A collection box will be placed next to the map in the back of the Church. They included:

- large safety pins
- medical gloves
- Band-Aids
- alcohol wipes
- gauze wrap
- triple antibiotic/Neosporin cream
- child strength pain medication
- medical tape
- stickers for children
- coloring books & crayons
- donations for basins, soap, & other supplies to be bought in country

Is one of them yours? A lot of items have been left the kitchen that belong to someone who brought something good to eat but didn't take home the container. These items are on a table in the fellowship hall.

A mission team from POP will be heading to Ecuador in February; Jordan Langness, Chris and Becca Alt and Chelsie Babcock. They will be helping Justo and Patricia Pillman and family in their mission work. Ecuador is a country with a corrupt mail system and the only way in which Pillmans can receive a package is if it is brought in a visitor's suitcase. WMF will be filling one of the extra suitcases that the mission team will take filled with items just for the Pillmans.

Below is a list of specific items Justo said they like and have a hard time getting or are too costly in Ecuador:

- * Burt's Bees night cream (any kind)
- * Natural soap bars (made with all natural ingredients)
- * Stickers and/or sticker books
- * Paint with water books
- * Snickers candy bars
- * Alkaline batteries (size AAA, AA, and C)
- * 2TB portable USB hard drive (call the office because Darcee knows the details)
- * Italian seasoning

Other things that missionaries appreciate are boxed/prepackaged items such as mac&cheese, pudding, snacks, seasoning packets, dry soup,

Oreos, jerky, licorice, chap stick. The Pillman children; Nathaniel- 4 or 5, Hannah-almost 3, Joshua-6 mos would enjoy books, crayons...I am sure you can think of something appropriate. I am always excited to send off a mission box. Do any of you remember "Pollyanna" and her missionary box experience?

Have the items to the church by Monday, February 8 so they can be packed.

Think Patio in this cold season. Imagine sitting out in your back yard sipping a beverage and enjoying a slice of pie. Looking around you, you see the just right item for that empty spot on your deck or in your office or family room. Stroll through the walkways between The Patios and take a closer look. This is the atmosphere for the spring fundraiser. 

• Worship Services on the Community TV Channel

Plans are for the recorded Sunday morning worship services that are taken to city hall to be soon broadcast each Sunday morning @ 9:30. The city of Beulah technician is working on the format details of the recorded services.

• Sound Booth

We talked a little about possibly needing an additional person to help in the sound booth. (Particularly during special programs & services). The camera has added some extra responsibility in addition to the sound, recording adjustments, as well as projector system occasional obstacles during the service. With only a few of us working the sound booth, we could use a little more help.

Trustee's Report – John Mohl

The Railing is in and is close to being finished. Handicap door Closers need to be installed, we are waiting for the fellowship hall fridge to get a new compressor installed (which is in, and is planning on installing it today possibly). The rock at the altar is installed.

Outdoor Bell Ringing System has been ordered with a deposit being sent.

All furnaces have been checked out and put into service with some issues with the older rooftop units. The new furnace by the library kicks out repeatedly during high winds. We have asked Hammerschmidt – Beulah Electric to look at this.

Snow removal list update. A list has been sent out but there is still room for more volunteers.

Outdoor Sign. A new ballast will be installed late spring or early summer. It seems to be working ok during this cooler weather

OLD BUSINESS

Loan principal amount – We approved to use \$10,000 from the General Fund to pay on the loan principal amount.

NEW BUSINESS

Mission Trip Scholarships – We approved giving up to \$200 to each person applying for scholarships for the mission trip to Ecuador.

Tithe – Our Tithe of \$2840.23 will be sent to the AFLC Home Missions.
