"Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you

shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

(Matthew 1:20-21 ESV)

It's hard to believe, but the seasons of Advent and Christmas are upon us. And although most of us know what the celebration is about, it's always good to refresh ourselves. It's good to do so as the commotion of the season always seems to eclipse its true meaning.

In the above passage, we see the words of the angel, spoken to Joseph, as he considered ending his relationship with Mary. All he knew, at this point, was that she was pregnant and that he was not the father. And he intended to divorce her, but sought to do it in a quiet way so that no harm might come to her.

However, an angel spoke to him the words we see above in a dream. And in these words, we're reminded of the true meaning of Christmas. We're reminded of the reason we celebrate, and what it means for us.

We learn, first of all, that we're sinners. We learn that we are guilty. We learn that we're rebellious and that we continually violate the will of God.

We learn also that we must be saved from our sin. The status quo just won't do. We can't remain in our sinful state and, at the same time, in relationship with God.

This, however, is what Jesus was sent to remedy. He came to deliver us from our sin. He came to reconcile us to God that we might receive the blessings he's prepared for us.

This is captured not only in the good news delivered by the angel, but also in the name assigned to the child. Joseph was to name the child

Jesus, a name that means “The Lord Saves” or “The Lord is Salvation.”

This is why we celebrate. Had Jesus not come, we would remain in our sin. Had Jesus not come, we would remain under condemnation. But he was sent by the Father, and he willingly came, that he might save us from our sin.

This salvation was accomplished by his death on the cross and his resurrection from the grave. By his death, he paid the penalty of our sin. He served as the atoning sacrifice for the sin of the world. And, by his resurrection, he defeated the power of death.

This blessing is available to each and every one. Through faith in him, we’re able to receive these blessings. Through faith in him, we receive the forgiveness of sins and the gift of eternal life.

*Arise, shine, for your light has come,
and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.*

*² For behold, darkness shall cover the earth,
and thick darkness the peoples;
but the Lord will arise upon you,
and his glory will be seen upon you.*

*³ And nations shall come to your light,
and kings to the brightness of your rising...*

*¹⁷ Instead of bronze I will bring gold,
and instead of iron I will bring silver;
instead of wood, bronze,

*I will make your overseers peace
and your taskmasters righteousness.*

*¹⁸ Violence shall no more be heard in your land,

*your light by day,
nor for brightness shall the moon
give you light;
but the Lord will be your everlasting light,

*²⁰ Your sun shall no more go down,
nor your moon withdraw itself;
for the Lord will be your everlasting light,
and your days of mourning shall be ended.*

*²¹ Your people shall all be righteous;
they shall possess the land forever,
the branch of my planting, the work of my hands,
that I might be glorified.*

Hanukkah has always been a bit of a mystery to me. Since I grew up somewhere where Hanukkah was not really known or experienced, I had never given it much thought, until last December when I found myself in Israel during both the Festival of Lights and Advent. (A generous, anonymous donor from Emmaus Free Lutheran in Bloomington is sending seminarians over there.) It was kind of a surreal experience and it made me wrestle with the differences between Advent and Hanukkah in a way I never had.

The festival of lights/Hanukkah/festival of dedication was first instituted to commemorate the rededication of the Jewish Temple which happened in 164 BC (1 Maccabees 4:52). It seems like at that point in time, the festival was easily aligned with the true faith, as the festival pointed to the Light of the LORD who the LORD’s faithful were patiently waiting for. Their faith rested on prophecies like Isaiah’s (which had been written over 600 years earlier) which said the true Light of the world would come bursting forth, and everything would change. Hanukkah was a holiday looking forward to the coming of Christ.

After the rededication of the Temple, it was clear that the LORD’s people desired to repent and be free from the sins that led to the abandonment of proper worship. They were ready to abandon gods made by human hands and instead serve, worship and be protected by the God of all creation. “The darkness that covers all the earth” as Isaiah calls it (verse 2) had invaded their Temple and the hearts of everyone in Jerusalem, and they longed for that

darkness to be overthrown and cast out. They longed to worship in faith, and make a better sacrifice to God (Hebrews 11:4), and so the Apocryphal book of 2nd Maccabees (10:3-4, NRSV) says-

³ They purified the sanctuary, and made another altar of sacrifice; then, striking fire out of flint, they offered sacrifices, after a lapse of two years, and they offered incense and lighted lamps and set out the bread of the Presence. ⁴ When they had done this, they fell prostrate and implored the Lord that they might never again fall into such misfortunes, but that, if they should ever sin, they might be disciplined by him with forbearance and not be handed over to blasphemous and barbarous nations.

The Light of Hanukkah was the promise God gave in Isaiah 60:18 that “violence shall no more be heard in your land, devastation or destruction within your borders; you shall call your walls Salvation, and your gates Praise.”

The hope that the ancient Jews clung to was that when they stopped worshipping created material things, they would also stop trusting in the created walls and gates of men for their security and their peace. Instead, they could worship the loving God of all creation and trust that their security was found in Him, not in man-made walls and gates. The difference was and still is as stark as the difference between light and darkness.

Yet, as time went on, the menorah took on a different meaning. The hope of an eternal kingdom faded, and as history marched on, the darkness of the nations again invaded Jerusalem, sometimes with swords, but more often with ideas. Human philosophies, inventions and distractions emptied the menorah of its Light, and the meaning of its hope became a point of dispute amongst the scribes, rabbis, Pharisees and Sadducees. So while many faithful Jews continued to hope for the true Light (Luke 1:79, 2:32), others had forsaken that hope and plotted instead for an earthly kingdom (John 19:12, 15).

When the true Light came into the world, only those who continued to stand on the promises in the Word of God recognized Him. All others, those whom the Word and Spirit had not made alive, loved the darkness rather than the Light (John 3:19).

Christ’s entrance into the world irrevocably divided the factions. The Advent wreath and the menorah, which had historically pointed to the same hope, became the symbols of two separate hopes.

The Advent wreath, based on the Word of God, points to the Truth that the Word has descended and become flesh and dwelt among us. The Light of eternity has even been here and been seen, touched, and heard (1 John 1:1).

The menorah became the lampstand of mankind, and became the symbol of man’s works-based aspiration to build earth-bound kingdoms of glory or pleasure, in the vain effort to ascend to heaven and dwell with the gods.

And so, when Jesus denounced the “cleansed and purified altar” of Hanukkah as defiled and murderous (Matthew 23:34-39, Luke 11:49-51), the divide became complete. Since then, all of mankind has faced the same binary decision when gazing at the menorah, namely: Is our source of all Light and Hope the Temple of Jesus Christ’s body? Or does our Light and Hope come from man-made lamps and man-made temples? It’s a testament to the sinfulness of mankind that 1,949 years after the destruction of the altar and its Temple (just as Jesus prophesied Mark 13:2, Luke 21:6, Matthew 24:2), the menorah endures as a symbol of mankind’s desire to worship God on mankind’s terms, in temples purified by mankind’s unrighteous works (Isaiah 64:6-7, 10-11), as unbelievers attempt to light their paths and build their own kingdoms apart from Christ.

There is a tremendous warning in all this for Christians. If the Advent wreath ever becomes a symbol of righteousness through religious dedication rather than the righteousness of Christ, the Advent wreath too will also become a lightless and hopeless decoration, useful only for Hallmark channel TV specials to use to point to the goodness

of mankind. But let's heed that warning and instead recognize that the Advent wreath points to the true Light of the world and to a Kingdom that is not of this world (John 8:23, 18:36), but is instead of a perfected world yet to come (Revelation 21:1-6, Isaiah 60:17-21).

When we are mindful that this is what the Advent wreath points to, we will never replace the Light of the Advent wreath with darkness, nor will we be willing to substitute the things and pursuits of earthly kingdoms for the glories of God's eternal Kingdom.

Since the Light has come into the world (John 1:9-10), we who trust in Him can proudly declare, with Isaiah, the Lord is our everlasting Light.



And on the 7th day...

Ever since the school year started it seems like it's been one thing after another, in the best and most exhausting ways. We just had our annual meeting last Sunday, and it was an opportunity for me to look back on the past year and recount on the subject of rest.

There have been moments in the past year of unbelievable busyness and moments of unreal rest. During the summer, for example there was one week where I needed to be in 3 different states in one week. And the very next week there were no youth events for 8 straight days. And this situation gave me a lot of insight on the task of rest. And I was left with this question, "What does rest look like in all of the different situations of life?" How do we rest when things get busy, and then rest the same amount when things get slow? How do we not rest to little when things are busy and how do we make sure we keep our rest in check and not to take too much rest when we have more than a moment?

God gave us rest because we needed it, but he also gave us jobs to do because we need them. And in order for us to divide our time between the two, there needs to be an exceptional understanding of God and what he wants from us. We need to understand what God would have us to do in the situations that are presented to us.

We need to ask ourselves, "What or who needs us the most right now?" There are times when I am needed by the youth or the church more than anyone or anything else. Likewise, there are times when I need to put my wife first before myself or my job. And lastly, there are times when I need to put myself first before my wife and my job and other people in my life.

And when I say that, I mean that there are times when I need to rest and take a minute for myself before I can help others. And that, in essence, is what rest was meant to be. Not a reason to be lazy, not an excuse, and not a time waster, but as a way to continue to do God's work on earth and to make sure we don't exhaust ourselves in that process.

President's Report – Del Schnaidt

Peter therefore was kept in prison: but prayer was made without ceasing of the church unto God for him – Acts 12:5

A precious scene is placed before us, even in the midst of an otherwise tragic and painful time for the early church. James had just been martyred by Herod, and the apostle Peter is in prison. But neither the threat of persecution nor the darkness of discouragement separated the church from each other. *(From a human perspective, I'm not sure this is possible without the help of the Holy Spirit giving the early Christians the courage to push on.)*

While Peter sits on a cold, hard floor, the saints of God kneel before God in unceasing intercession on his behalf. It seems the more suffering is inflicted on the church, the more pressure is exerted upon the church, the closer they grow to God and to each other. *(These were no doubt hard times of persecution and torture which often led to death, where the church faithfully depended on God.)*

It is sad and wrong that so often, in today's prosperous and peaceful Western culture, Christians so easily stumble and divide over petty and unimportant issues. We are oversensitive to criticism or correction; we feel as though others should forebear (*refrain, hold back*) us, but we are not willing to forebear others. Offenses or differences which would go unnoticed in a time of persecution are made insurmountable obstacles to fellowship in the time of prosperity.

Doubtless James (one of the "sons of thunder") and Peter (who was always putting his foot in his mouth) had at times said and done some things that were disagreeable to others in the church. But those offenses are forgotten now, as the church hears of James' death and Peter's imprisonment.

Brothers and sisters, don't wait until persecution, or loss, or pain comes in order to love each other fervently. Look over faults; forgive wrongs; let go of past grievances. Love, and pray for, each other now!

OLD BUSINESS

Fellowship Room Ceiling/Insulation/Lights

Update – Original scope was to tear down ceiling and put panels to hold insulation up. Now plan to put plywood strips up to keep the insulation in the attic. Randy Schneider has checked and we will need a certified electrician to install the lights. Cost

is approximately \$65.00 per light kit and there are about 65 lights in the Fellowship Hall; this does not include the cost of the certified electrician.

NEW BUSINESS

Commune twice or once a month – Pastor Kent had a member approach him raising the question about having communion twice a month. There is nothing in scripture that's definitive and congregations have done various time frames. Discussion needing more people to prepare the wine and bread for communion if we have communion twice a month. Motion to have communion twice a month was defeated.

North Entrance Walkway and Southeast Sloped Walkway Replacement – Received bid from Winkler Construction of Hazen. Bid for removal of sidewalk on southeast corner and replacing with concrete steps and removal of concrete ramp on north side is \$3,100. Additional cost of replacing the north ramp with composite material estimated at \$1,400. Plan to reuse the railing on north side. Motion to go ahead and proceed with the concrete work with the estimated bid was approved.

Church Van – Discussion on purchasing van to use for church functions such as youth, men and WMF events. Les Buchmann spoke on cost and condition of vans he has located. We discussed insurance, storage, dependability and upkeep. Other costs are gas, tires, batteries, oil changes, etc. Only rental place that rents 15-passenger vans is in Fargo. Motion to give church council approval to buy van that they see fit was approved by 36 yes votes and 2 no votes.
