"You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. It shall not be so among you.

But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be your slave, even as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

(Matthew 20:25-28 ESV)

One of the things we see, as we look at society, as well as at the church, is a misunderstanding of what leadership is to look like. We share this misunderstanding regardless of whether we see authority in a positive or a negative light. And we tend to understand leadership, we tend to understand authority, as a matter of control. We tend to understand it as a matter of domination.

The one who is in charge, we believe, is the one who yells the loudest. The one who is in charge, we believe, is the one before whom everyone cringes. The one who is in charge, we believe, is the one who uses his strength to force submission upon everyone else.

This is why we often bristle when we hear the Bible's instructions for the order of the household. This is why we bristle when we read that women aren't to teach or to have authority over the men of the church. If men are truly the head, we take this to mean that they're to dominate women. If men are truly the head, we take this to mean that they're to dominate their spouse and children. If men are the head, we take this to mean that they're to control everything that goes on. And this, we believe, is demeaning to women. This, we believe, is abusive of children.

This is also why we have a natural tendency to resist those in authority over us. We don't want to be controlled by anyone. And we won't allow anyone to rule over us.

Yet, at the same time, we naturally desire to be that person in authority. We want to be the one in control. We want to be the one to whom everyone submits.

However, when we look at Jesus' definition of leadership, it's very different. Jesus tells us that, whoever would be great among us, must be our servant. He tells us that, whoever would be first among us, must be our slave.

In fact, he uses himself as the ultimate example of this truth. Even he, Jesus says, came not to be served. Even though he is God in the flesh, and even though he rightfully deserves to be served, that was not his purpose in coming among us. He came that he might serve. He came that he might give his life as a ransom for many.

In other words, to be a leader means to be a servant. To be a leader means to be a slave of all. To be a leader means that we willingly sacrifice ourselves for the benefit of others.

Even if we do have a measure of authority that's been entrusted to us, we don't use that authority for our own benefit. We use it for the benefit of those in our charge. We use it to serve.

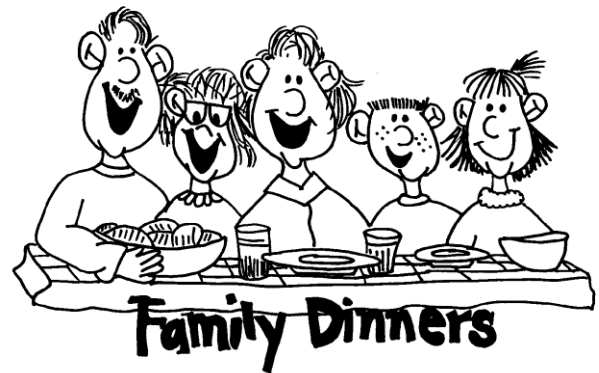
We find the same thing in Ephesians 5, where Paul lays out the order of the household. The husband, he says, is the head. This, however, does not mean that he rules his household with an iron fist. He is called to lay his life down for the sake of his spouse. He is to use his authority for her blessing.

The wife, in turn, doesn't submit simply because her husband demands it. She doesn't submit because she's forced to do so. She does it willingly. She does it voluntarily. She does so that, in this way, she might honor God and bless her husband.

We see this also, as Paul instructs children and fathers in Colossians 3. He tells children to obey their parents in everything. In this, we see the

authority structure of this relationship. Yet, at the same time, he tells fathers that they're not to provoke their children, lest they become discouraged. They aren't to be harsh, they aren't to treat their children unjustly, as they carry out their responsibility among them.

This is what it means to exercise authority at all levels. This is what it means to exercise authority as a husband, as a parent, as a church leader, or as a government official. This is what it means to exercise authority as a business owner or a manager. As Jesus used his authority to serve us, we're to use our authority, whatever it may be, to serve those in our care.

Luke 9:51–55 (EHV) *When the days were approaching for him to be taken up, Jesus was determined to go to Jerusalem. He sent messengers ahead of him. They went and entered a Samaritan village to make preparations for him. But the people did not welcome him, because he was determined to go to Jerusalem. When his disciples James and John saw this, they said, “Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to consume them?”*

But he turned and rebuked them. “You don’t know what kind of spirit is influencing you. For the Son of Man did not come to destroy people’s souls, but to save them.”

Luke 19:10 (EHV) *The Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost.*

This portion of Luke is a good place to look as we start to think about Lent. Luke 9:51 marks a point in Jesus’ ministry when He turned south and started a resolute march toward Jerusalem. He knew what lay in front of Him, even if the disciples could not yet fully grasp what He was doing and the meaning of why He was doing it. It was mysterious for the disciples. They didn’t always know what they were doing, but for them, it was enough that they simply walk with Him. As they walked and lived with the Word made flesh, the meaning of His incarnation and His upcoming sacrifice became more and more clear.

The disciples weren’t perfect. For example, the “Sons of Thunder” (Mark 3:17) wanted to go all Sodom and Gomorrah on a village in Samaria, showing just how fitting their God-given nickname really was. The thing is though, John and James’ error wasn’t that they completely lacked biblical knowledge. James and John knew the Word. It seems likely that James and John were simply applying biblical lessons from stories like Sodom and Gomorrah (Genesis 18:16-19:29, see also Jude

5-7, 2 Peter 2:4-10 and Ezekiel 16:48-52) and Elijah calling down fire from heaven against platoons of Samaritan soldiers (2 Kings 1). Their error (in this case) did not stem from them not knowing the Word of God. Their error was that they did not fully appreciate the purpose for which the Word was given.

Jesus was not walking through Samaria so that He could call down eternal hellfire from heaven on every town that did not receive Him. This was an important lesson for the disciples, and a fitting time for the disciples to begin learning it. From His teachings prior to this point, it was clear to the disciples that Jesus was going to be the one to fully restore the Kingdom of God, but the disciples remained confused about what that Kingdom was and how Jesus was going to usher it in.

Their desire for an earthly and glorious Kingdom led them to assume that Jesus would very soon begin an earthly and glorious reign. They figured that when that happened, surely Jesus’ acts of vengeance against the enemies of the people of God would be more powerful and more glorious than anything previously seen. James and John were all too ready for Jesus to begin conquering the world, and were all too willing to help in the conquest. After all, they were hoping for powerful positions in the new Kingdom and even bragged (but maybe without fully understanding what they were saying) that they could endure the same cup of wrath as Jesus (Mark 10:35-45, Matthew 20:20-28).

But Jesus’ walk toward Jerusalem was not about unleashing the flames of heaven against all the unrighteous of the world. Jesus’ walk toward Jerusalem was about turning the flames of heaven toward Himself, and teaching everyone else to trust in that sacrifice. Jesus did not need the Samaritan village to house Him. In verse 58 He explained that part of His ministry involved Him sleeping under the stars. Jesus didn’t need to invade any of the Samaritans homes, but He desperately wanted to invade their hearts.

There is a caution in this for us as we consider the Lenten season. We should consider both the

Samaritans and the Sons of Thunder and try to avoid either extreme.

Even though Jesus seeks us the whole year, Lent is a special time. It's easy to proclaim "I'm proudly casting off the bonds of works-righteousness. I'm not changing anything I do for Lent." But that approach runs the risk of going the way of the Samaritan village. Jesus is seeking to spend time with you. He always does, but especially in this time of Lent. So when we skip chances to worship with the body of Christ- His Church, or when we ignore His nagging call on us to walk with Him in our personal times of Bible reading and prayer, we've become very much like the Samaritan village. Jesus desires to come to us, but we don't receive Him.

On the flip side, there's perhaps no church season that has become more polluted with practices that teach people works-righteousness than Lent. Mandatory fasting and the condemnation of people who don't fast is directly analogous to James and John, who apparently expected the Kingdom of God to come through the conquering efforts of man. Jesus' walk to Jerusalem was not an invitation for His disciples to conquer for Him. It was an invitation for His disciples to walk with Him, and learn from Him, and come to understand the purpose of God giving us His Word: to seek and to save the lost.

So this Lenten season, I encourage you to walk with Jesus. Don't ignore Him as the Samaritans did, and don't attempt to add to His righteousness with your polluted works, as John and James did. Instead, walk with Him and learn from Him how He cleanses you from sin and unrighteousness. Join us, if you can, for Wednesday worship services, and be intentional about meditating on Scripture. Fast if you desire, knowing that for your sake Jesus had precious few comforts during His earthly ministry (Luke 9:58). But also know that the correct purpose of fasting is not to contribute to Christ's righteousness, but rather to draw closer to Christ, to learn to walk with Him, to grow and mature in His grace, and to trust in His righteous sacrifice even more.

"Bless the Lord, O my soul: and all that is within me, bless his holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits. Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who health all thy diseases; Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowned thee with loving kindness and tender mercies; Who satisfies thy mouth with good things; so that thy youth is renewed like the eagles".

This always lifts me when I read it. I hope you can find some Joy and comfort In this Psalm. One of the projects I am excited about this year is working with the Feed My Starving Children project.

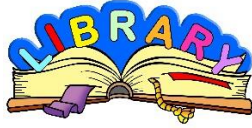

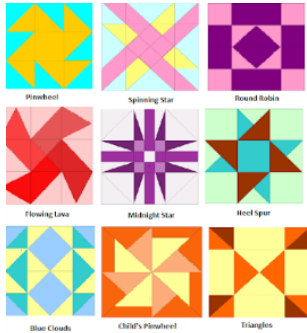

Do You Feel Blessed?

How do we know if we are blessed? Do you feel blessed? We spend a lot of time waiting around to be blessed and even more time waiting to feel blessed, myself included. Recently I have been looking in the Word to see how we are blessed, in an effort to feel more blessed, and you know what I found? We don't have to look as far as I thought. It truly is a matter of perspective, and how we treat ourselves.

How we look at ourselves and how we view God ultimately determines how and if we see God's blessings. I remember once I heard a story about a man whose house was flooding. He got on his roof and waited for God to save him. A man rowed a boat over to him and told him to get in, and the man said, "I don't need your boat, God will save me." Then a little bit later a helicopter flew over to him and told him to get in, and the man said, "I don't need a ride in your helicopter, God will save me." Eventually the water got too high and he drowned, when he got to heaven he asked God why He didn't save him. And God responded, "What are you talking about!? I sent you a boat AND a helicopter!"

When we look for blessings from God, we typically have a small lens through which we look. We see when God gives us what we weren't expecting but we constantly overlook when we are gifted the expected. For example, I felt unbelievably blessed and overwhelmingly encouraged when Prince of

Peace acquired a church/youth van recently. It was truly an answer to much prayer and deliberation. But in that I started to look at other ways that I am blessed, the moments that I had let go under the radar and had just missed. The blessing of people helping with youth activities from chaperones to people to bring food. The blessing of my wife and how crucial she is to my work and private life. The blessing of energy and youthfulness to do my job well. The blessing of youth (even though sometimes they drive me nuts:) and their willingness to hear and absorb your gospel. In other words... I am finding the problem is not God's ability to bless, but our lack of vision and ability to accept his gifts as blessings. And luckily, God doesn't stop giving his blessings just because we can't see clearly. Instead He graciously waits for us to open our eyes and see His gifts, because He truly is a good good Father.

Deacon's Report – Kevin Lee

Lent will start on February 26th. We are planning to have Pastor Kent, Kevin, and Seth rotate for Wednesday services. We are moving forward with meals prior to the worship services.

Easter – We discussed at council making changes to the Easter breakfast. After looking at 6:00 AM Sunrise service and Easter breakfast attendance the last few years, we are suggesting changing the 6:00 AM service to 7:00 AM, and serving caramel roles and coffee from 8:00 to 9:00.

Darcee has been looking into a new program for church records and financial records. The old one is out of date, needing to be updated. She's looking at a package that would do this and also tie

in other services we're already paying for (online directory, proclaim, and our website). It also has some great Bible study resources available to staff and the congregation as a whole. And it has a streaming library for use by the church. The Deacons are in favor of the new program and stopping the "Right Now Media."

Joyce Bauer signed a contract with FMSC to have a mobile pack at POP Oct. 3rd, 2020.

We voted to purchase Faithlife Equip program. Annual cost for size of our church is \$1,250 per year.
